Tackling undeclared work is primarily in the hands of national authorities, yet key players are joining forces to learn and act together across Europe.

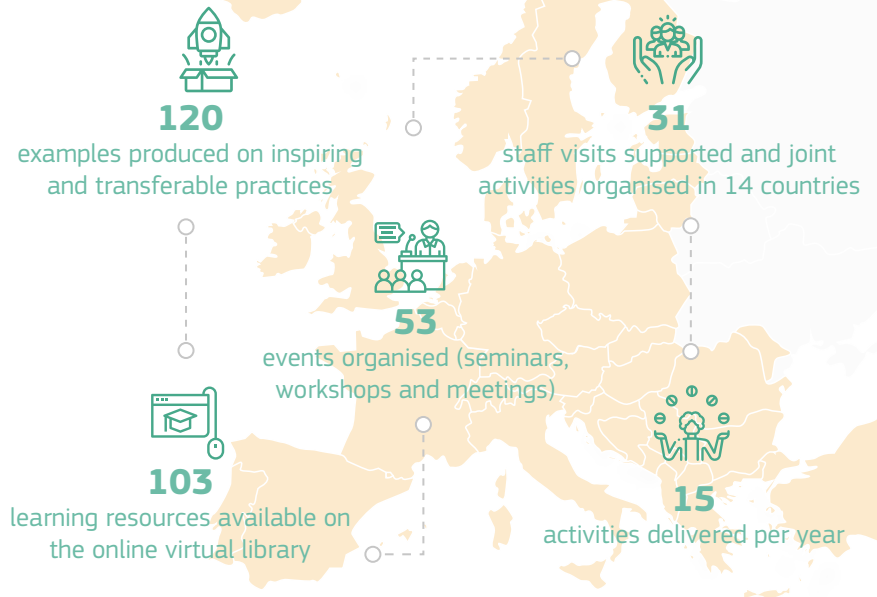
