## UNDECLARED WORK

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#### The European Platform on undeclared work

Welcome to the second edition of the Platform newsletter. Each issue provides updated information on past, current and future activities of the European Platform on undeclared work (UDW).



### Platform plenary meeting, 9-10 March Platform members and observers came together to discuss bogus self-employment, with presentations from

Professor Jason Heyes, author of the forthcoming Platform study on this topic, as well as Platform members from a number of countries. The debate covered a number of subjects, from the scope of BSE and its consequences, to how Member States and social partners, as well as the Platform itself can try to tackle it. There followed a discussion on the way forward for the Platform, focusing on upcoming activities of the work

programme. This included a contribution from Tom Bevers, Chair of the Employment Committee (EMCO). It was agreed that the UDW Platform and EMCO will support each other's work by sharing expertise and exchanging information. 


